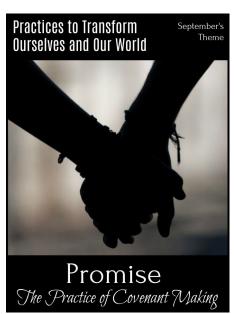
September 3 Religion as Survival Strategy

A new church year begins, and we have a new slate of themes: different practices through which to transform ourselves and our world (recall that our congregation's mission is to "transform our selves and our world through compassionate action"). Here's the slate:

As usual, we will delve into our themes in our **Sunday worship services**.

We plan to offer the **Soul Matters Small Group** sessions **January – June**. These are facilitated groups of 8-10 participants. Participants spend the month exploring the theme individually, guided by a packet of rich resources that include provocative questions, spiritual exercises, as well as quotations, videos, suggested movies, books, etc. Participants then meet with their small group at the end of the month to listen and share with fellow seekers. Groups will meet once/month for 6 sessions, January through June, 2018. Stay tuned for sign-ups!

In the meantime, we're going to try something different – stand-alone, one-time, drop-in, open-to-anyone, after church **Theme Exploration** sessions. Come to one or both!

PROMISE: THE PRACTICE OF COVENANT MAKING

For this month, the month in which we explore "**Promise: the practice of covenant making**," here are some questions to spark your thinking. Discuss the questions at coffee hour with a fellow congregant, at the dinner table with a friend or with family, and/or journal about them on you own.



- 1. What kinds of promises do you make, if any, in your everyday living?
- 2. To what extent do you keep your promises? What challenges do you face?
- 3. What are the most significant promises, covenants, pledges, or vows you have made in your life?
- 4. If the world (or "Life") could make you a promise, what would you want that promise to be?
- 5. If you were to make one promise to the world (or to "Life"), what would it be?
- 6. Often, being in covenanted relationship means sticking with it through the hard stuff. In what ways have you done this in your life?
- 7. When you have failed to live up to your own aspirations of covenantal relationship, how do you forgive yourself, and begin again in love?
- 8. Sometimes living up to the covenant of right relationship means setting boundaries, re-shaping, or even ending relationship. How do you decide when/how to do this? How do you do it with respect and openheartedness?
- 9. So much is broken in this world. Oppression, violence, the destruction of our earth's resources. What societal covenant-making and covenant-repairing calls to you? How might we, as human beings, make reparations, and begin again in love? What is one small thing you can do toward that end this month?

Are Canadian Consumers Allowed to Avoid Genetically Modified Salmon?

On August 11, the Times Colonist reported (page B4) that "4.5M tonnes of GE salmon sold in Canada." Later the article says it was 4.5 tonnes, but that is still a large amount. Canada refuses to label GE modified foods in deference to the companies that make them, and to impede people like me from refusing to eat GE foods.

I refuse to eat them because as a retired scientist, I know that they were barely tested (90-day feeding trials) in rats for safety. I also know that some studies, disputed by the makers of GE corn, have shown that rats fed GE corn over a longer time developed tumors and died sooner compared to controls.

Even more fundamental reasons for avoiding GE foods are the understanding that they are produced for profit (to grow faster or to allow herbicide and pesticide use and industrial farming rather than organic farming practices). Most of us understand that the profit goal is not aimed at keeping us healthy. It is certainly not aimed at avoiding global warming or war. So my advice, which I will follow, is to only eat wild salmon. Only wild salmon is certain not to be GE. I intend to live beyond my 92nd birthday next month by avoiding GE food.

A Note Regarding the Environmental Action Team (EAT):

Thanks to Ed for writing about an important issue this month. Ed was a very active member of our team for several years and currently acts as consultant. Your Environmental Action Team has been around for a long time as a subcommittee of the Social Responsibility Coalition. BOARD BUSINESS

The following is a snapshot of the Board meeting held on August 1st, 2017. The minutes will be posted in the Lion Hall.

A review is under way by John Worton and Lynn Beak to ensure our church constitution and bylaws comply with the new Societies Act.

Clarification was asked for regarding "financial contribution of record" for members. John W. will follow up with Membership committee.

Marion Pape reports that work has begun on analyzing the objectives put forth by the three strategic planning sessions. They will be presented at the September 24th congregational planning session.

Shirley Travis, archivist John Stewart and office administrator, Nadia are working on goals for maintaining church records, many of which now sit in individuals' computers. Nadia is also organizing historical computer documents to make them readily available.

A 1-day CUC regional gathering of the Islands is to be held in the Spring of 2018. The location is set for First Unitarian. Date and theme will be decided following a Zoom conference on October 4th.

Ministerial Intern report – Shirley T. Chris Wulff and his wife, Ariel, have moved to Vancouver where Ariel has accepted a position at North Shore Unitarian Church. Chris will be in Victoria over weekends until his term ends in June 2018. Commuting is not an unusual situation for interns.

Treasurer, Jane Wilson, gave the financial reports which are in good shape.

The Diversity Team and Pride Parade were discussed. Currently there is no one sitting on the Diversity team so this year's Pride Parade and attendance at the Festival were organized in short order. The heavy parade banner was carried by too few. With the receipt of an excellent report from Liz Graham and comments from others, the Outreach Council, SRC and Chaplains will be working together with the Board to better prepared for next year.

The Board would like to appoint a member to replace the vacancy in the Property Management Council. An agenda for the Board's retreat on August 22nd was approved.

Our Board and the Capital UU Congregation Board will be meeting on September 19th for our annual gathering as we discuss and plan common ventures.

A clarification was made of comments regarding the newsletter. In the interest of saving postal fees, a request had been made for members/friends to receive copies digitally. For those who prefer a hard copy, no payment is necessary.

Word was received that the refinishing of the sanctuary floor would not be completed by Sunday, August 6th. Arrangements were made to hold the service outdoors.

Read into the minutes were new members, Shannon Roberts and her daughter, Elizaveta.

Resignations were received from Pat McMahon and John Lancaster, who are moving to Salt Spring Island. Alex Van Tol and children Ethan and Jonas have to take a break for now because of time commitments.

Pies are also a hot item.

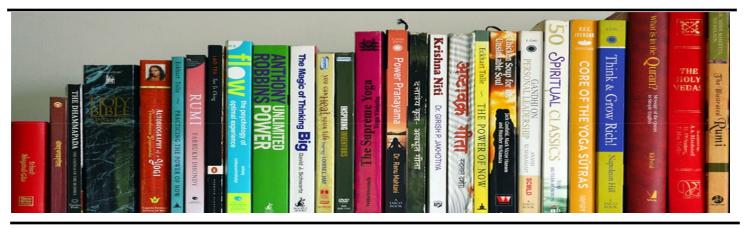

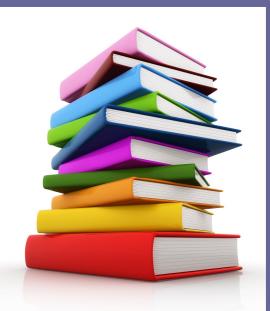

ENGAGING WITH RECONCILIATION

Faye Mogenson, Children's Spritiual Development and Learning Director, will be piloting a CUC-developed series with the young children this fall.

We are pleased to have received funding from the Innovations Fund to support our congregation's continuing commitment to fostering reconciliation with indigenous peoples. A 'cluster' of us are coordinating these two activities. Watch the *E-weekly* and upcoming newsletters for more details.

On January 19-20, 2018, we are sponsoring, with Theatre for Living and Cadboro Bay UnitedChurch, *šx*?am³t (home)*, *an interactive forum play* about reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people. This will create a deeper understanding of the issues and honour our interdependence. It's interactive, engaging and transformative. Plan to be there and mark the dates now!

We are getting ready to host *indigenous artist[s]* in residence in Spring 2018 to provide a means of educating and engaging children, youth and adults in our congregation in indigenous ways of knowing and encouraging deeper relationships. We'll be engaging in a conversation about the purpose and best means to make this happen in the coming weeks.

GETTING YOUR ADVANCE CARE PLAN DONE

A workshop on four Mondays Oct. 30, Nov. 6, 13, and 20 1:30-3:30 pm in the Common Room Presented by Choices in Dying Victoria

Have you written your Advance Care Plan describing the medical treatments you want and don't want, if you are not able to speak for yourself? Have you filled out the required form appointing a representative and an alternative to speak for you, if you cannot speak for yourself? If your answer is NO, this is the workshop for you. Perhaps you have been intending to do so, but haven't got around to it. There are reasons for this, other than procrastination.

By the end of this workshop, you will actually have completed your Advance Care Plan, ready for signing. At the end of the first session, you will be asked if you wish to continue, which means committing to complete the course including some "between-sessions activity" (aka homework). A \$5.00 fee includes the booklet *My Voice*, payable at the first session.

Registration: This is a repeat of the course that was given last Feb/March. 17 people were left on the wait list. If you were one of these people, a place is being held for you **until Sept. 15**th. Be sure to register by then. Otherwise it is first-come, first-served. The maximum number of participants is 24. In order to facilitate preparation of materials, preregistration is required.

Orange Shirt Day Saturday, September 30

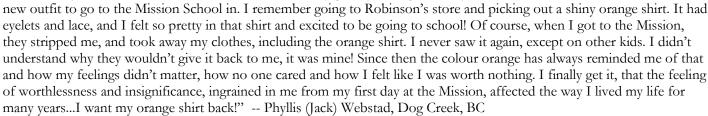

It is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come."

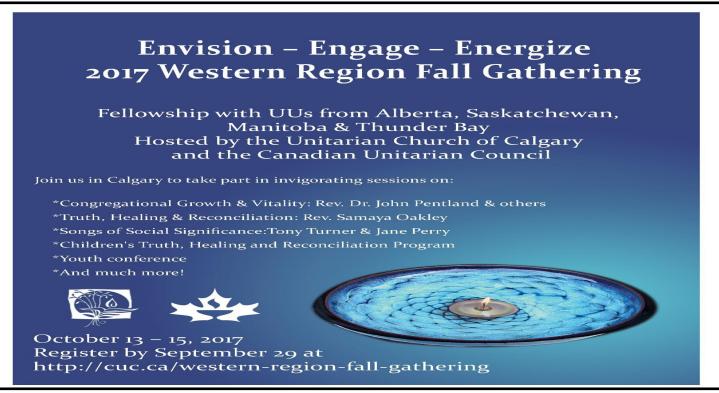
International Council of Unitarians and Universalists Meet in the Khasi Hills of India, February 2018

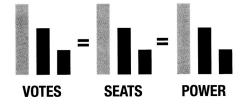
Majority governments elected by a minority of voters?

The first article in this series, in August, noted that our governments are hugely influenced by corporations and the wealthy, and that we the people have little say over policies despite letters, rallies, etc. One way to strengthen our democracy is to change the voting system.

In most democratic countries, the proportion of seats each political party has in parliament is nearly the same as the proportion of votes each party received in the preceding election. This is "proportional representation" (PR—see graph). Canada is an exception: we frequently have majority governments wielding all the power that got elected with less than 50% of the votes (sometimes less than 40%).

This is possible because we still use the "First Past the Post" (FPTP) voting system. With FPTP, parties need only win more votes than any other party to win a seat. In a two-party system, this works well, but with more than two parties the results are often unfair.

Furthermore, with FPTP, people frequently feel a need to vote strategically because otherwise their vote doesn't count towards electing anyone. E.g., no Green candidate has ever been elected in mainland B.C. Green votes there are counted, but they don't count—they're wasted! With PR, if the Greens get 10% of the votes, they get 10% of the seats in parliament (or the legislature).

Votes are also wasted when a candidate gets more votes than needed to win a seat. Say, for instance, two candidates are competing in a riding where a hundred votes are cast. When one candidate has 51 votes, he/she has won the seat. If that candidate gets 75 votes, 24 of those votes are unnecessary, they don't affect the outcome, they also are "wasted votes." Some forms of PR resolve that problem, too.

Next month we'll look at three forms of proportional voting that could be used in B.C.

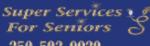
