Resisting and Resistance

This month’s theme is Resistance: Standing Up for Your Values. When I first started reflecting on resistance as a theme it seemed fairly obvious and straightforward. We think politics. We think about how we work against unjust systems by doing things to disrupt and resist the way they function. This is, of course, at the core of what resistance means. We have seen many courageous and inspiring examples both throughout human history and in our current time of people effecting real change through resistance. We protest, we petition, we take to social media, and in whatever form our resistance takes we assert that we believe there is a better and other way than a status quo that holds so many down and back. This aspect of resistance will certainly be part of our services this month. What places do you want to assert your values in 2018?

The more I reflected, however, the more I realized (as is always the case with our themes and why I enjoy them so) that there is also an internal dimension of resistance to explore. We often resist things in ourselves or in our lives. We dig in our heels or push against things we’d prefer not to see. How does resistance serve us well and where does it limit us to patterns and habits that are not the healthiest for us? As we lean into a new year think about the places in your being that might need less resistance and more openness.

Here are the Soul Matters questions to ponder:

What would happen if you saw praise, joy or the creation of beauty as your primary form of resistance? What if the world needs your praise as much as your picket signs? What if it needs the creation of beauty as much as the elimination of injustice?

Martin Luther King, Jr. wrote, "Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter." How is life asking you to end your silence?

The psychiatrist Carl Jung wrote, "What you resist, persists." So, is it possible that your resistance is the source of the struggle you are in? Would the fight end if you stopped fighting? Would the wall fall down if you stopped pushing on it?

Is it possible that your refusal to give up and give in may be a way of avoiding the pain?

Is labeling them the enemy defeating both them and you?

What would happen if you saw your justice work not as saving the world or bending the arc of the universe towards justice, but simply as "being a pest"? (Inspired by the Dalai Lama, who wrote: "If you think you are too small to make a difference, try sleeping with a mosquito.")

If none of these questions speak to you, what is yours?

SEL-CY HIGHLIGHTS FOR JANUARY

- Children and youth programming resumes on **January 7**.
 - **K/Grade 1** begin the Our Whole Lives (OWL) program which engages children with stories, songs and activities that explore birth, babies, bodies and families
 - **Grades 2-5** are embarking on a new program for the New Year. The program will use storytelling to explore difficult decisions and situations and illustrate spiritual and ethical tools they will need to make choices and act on their values.
 - **Grades 6-8** will be continuing the Coming of Age program, including having our second Coming of Age sleepover (January 20/21).
 - **Grades 9-12** will be offered classes in mindfulness beginning in late January.
- In late January (the date is as yet to be determined), a time of celebration and learning for SEL-CY leaders.

REFUGEE REPORT

SUELLEN GUENTHER

We are all feeling frustrated that there is still no positive news about the arrival of the Sari family, but the Refugee Steering Committee would like you to know our church has had a positive impact on the life of our Iranian refugee, Sanaz (Sunny) Soltan. Because of our support, she was able to concentrate on classes to improve her English, earn money to update the computer equipment she uses, and accumulate a little savings. We helped her do government paperwork, settled her in a lovely furnished suite, and paid the money owed to Canada for her transportation from Turkey. At the end of our sponsorship, we helped her find a new place to live and moved her in.



Our support ended in September and she is now paying her own way. She is making due on low paying jobs for now, and although she has made more money as a server in the past, she has decided she doesn't want the pressure of that kind of work. She is tired of putting on fake smiles and dealing with large groups of people. Instead, she is taking care of her health, will be seeing a psychiatrist in 2018 for her depression, and is slowly making a few friends. She is also figuring out how to fit into Canadian society, where the treatment of women is so very different from Iran.

Sunny is getting a lot of extra work at Spencer's over Christmas, and the manager at Spencer's really likes Sunny and has helped her get a second job in a commercial kitchen at a small company that makes fresh juices. Sunny really likes the people there and the company is considering opening a store in the spring where they may hire Sunny full time to manage it. Although Sunny likes to shop and is very generous with her gifts, she has decided she can manage on what she makes for now and she will forego extra spending. Next year, she is planning to take the English exam that is an entrance requirement for UVIC. When she is ready to return to school, paying tuition while supporting herself will be a huge obstacle to figure out.

At present, Sunny is renting a room in the home of a retired teacher who often invites her for supper, even though she is not paying for board. Her landlady's daughter often comes for Sunday dinner and the two young women have become good friends, hanging out together, talking and listening to music. Sunny is now vegan, so she won't eat some of her favourite things, like strawberry-rhubarb pie, because the crust is not vegan. She loves eggs, but will eat them only if they are from a free-range farm; she calls them "happy eggs." Sunny is an excellent cook and so is her landlady, so they sometimes cook together. Sunny has told her landlady that she feels like she is part of a family again, and she will be included in the holiday celebrations with her landlady's extended family.

The landlady's daughter has seen our rainbow banner in the Pride Parade and the landlady overheard her daughter tell Sunny, "The Unitarian church is an awesome church," to which Sunny enthusiastically agreed. So we have made a positive impact on the lives of two young lesbian women, even though they don't attend our church.

Please know that whatever your part was in supporting this young woman, you have made a difference in her life.

REFUGEE STEERING COMMITTEE**CHRISTINE JOHNSTON**

The Refugee Steering Committee still meets to update ourselves on actions in the community by the “Victoria Advocates for Refugees” group as well as news about Sunny and the family. But we are sad to learn that Suellen Guenther, our talented news reporter, will be leaving us in January due to other demands on her time and energies. She has been a faithful team member, full of wisdom and humour, and we want to thank her for all she has done - which is not just keeping you all informed. Due to her too, we have found Sunny a great home and she will tell you herself about that successful ending to this sponsorship.

Meanwhile, we invite anyone interested in joining us to speak to me soon. News reporting is one job we need doing, as is planning for the future. We are also exploring what all we can do in the meantime to help refugees already in Victoria. Contact me please at christine_johnston@telus.net.

A Refugee Family Needing Help

The Refugee Steering Committee of the church along with Galina Coffey-Lewis and Jim Lewis request your suggestions and help with a refugee family needing help. The Committee discussed and approved helping other refugee families in need while we wait for the family we expect. Here is one example:

Galina Coffey-Lewis and Jim Lewis have become friends with two Syrian adults (a man and his elderly mother) whose only sponsor a year ago was the government. (NB: Government sponsorship means welfare rates only and no private supportive sponsorship.) This man is seeking any leads or information about jobs in Victoria which hopefully might match his background. He has excellent English skills, good experience in training, development and human resources in several Middle East countries.

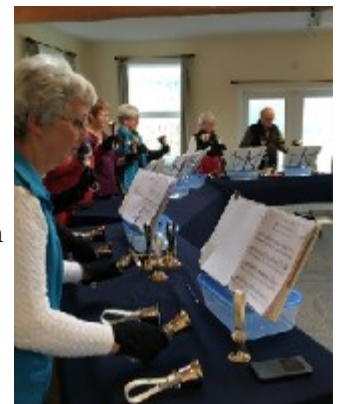
We are also looking for any double or queen mattresses in good condition; our only concern is that one of these people has severe allergies to cats and dogs.

Can anyone help with this family? Suggestions? JOB opportunities? Better accommodation? Good quality mattresses? Our Refugee Fund is being kept for the family but a little money might be squeezed to help here, such as mattress covers and a bus pass. We gave this man a bicycle this year, which he much appreciates.

Following is a snapshot of the Board meeting held on December 5, 2017. A full set of minutes is posted on the Lion Hall notice board and is also available from the office.

Strategic Planning:

A survey using Survey Monkey was sent to all members and friends. Hard copies are available in the office.

New SEL-CY Director:

The Board approved the hiring of Arran Liddel. Reverend Melora, as his supervisor, will contact Arran.

Committee on Ministry:

Mark Danley has agreed to serve on this committee. Members rotate on and off this committee in a three year cycle.

Ministerial Intern:

Chris Wulff received a 'one,' the highest level, in his interviews in Boston earlier this week. He has received preliminary fellowship contingent upon successful completion of his internship.

Treasurer's Report:

Overall expenses are within budget; however, maintenance is currently over budget by about 16% because of a number of urgent repairs.

SRC Motion:

Moved by Karen Furnes, seconded by John Tiffany, that further to discussion by the Social Responsibility Coalition (SRC), the Board of Trustees at First Unitarian Church of Victoria hereby recognizes and affirms, in the spirit of radical inclusiveness, that donations are not required to participate in church events. Motion Carried. Lorna will talk with SRC and the office regarding appropriate signs to be posted for events.

Zoie Gardner Fund:

Moved by John Worton, seconded by Jane Wilson that Remi Odense and John Worton become Trustees of the Zoie Gardiner Trust Fund so that the Trustees are then June Fukushima, Frances Hancock, Christine Johnston, Remi Odense and John Worton. Motion Carried.

2018 Budget:

Finance Chair, David Hoadley, joined the meeting for an in-camera discussion of the draft budget. As it now stands, there is a shortfall of \$15,000 from the ABC target and approximately \$15,000 in unexpected property maintenance costs.

Read into the minutes were New Members: Patricia Jean Hofstrand, Karen and Steve Sharlow. Resignations: Sylvia McDonald, Sally and Eric Murphy. Death: Doreen Wood (Lifetime member)

FROM THE PROPERTY COUNCIL

JOHN TIFFANY**Update on Building Maintenance Costs**

Costs this year to maintain and enhance our church property are higher than each of the past four years.

Three of this year's major projects – the flooring in Lion Hall, a drainage system outside the main entrance-way and replacing the dangerously rotting main staircase for the Farmhouse – had been on hold for the past two to three years.

The Lion Hall laminated flooring began failing after the roof leaked. Water damage caused the floor to pop up in three places, creating a tripping hazard. The replacement floor, a vinyl plank installed last August, cost \$8,500. The new planks are moisture proof.

The lack of a working drainage system outside the main entrance caused ponding which turned to slippery ice spots in the winter. The new 36-foot drain, installed last September, cost \$11,600.

And the rotten and unsafe Farmhouse staircase is currently being replaced at an estimated cost of \$9,000.

In addition, this year we had to replace flooring in the school break room after a water leak, at a cost of \$2,500.

The total cost of these projects, as well as several other repairs/projects, has lowered the Property Fund to \$10,000.

And the repairs go on. Heavy rains in November challenged the school tar and gravel roofs (which are 35 years old). All of the issues have now been addressed, but at an estimated cost of \$5,000.

One problem was the roof over the porch at the school's main entrance. When it failed, water leaked into the exterior wall, doors and the door frame. A replacement torch-on roof will cost \$1,650.

Another section, over the wing connecting Lion Hall and the school, has leaked causing damage to the school flooring. A broken downspout caused most of the damage. Water flowed into cracks in the stucco wall, on into the wall cavity and then on to the flooring.

Next on the work list is the Farmhouse carport, which is in very poor shape and in danger of collapsing with heavy snow. Demolition costs are estimated at \$1,200. (But this cost is much lower than expected thanks to Andy Lee, who is volunteering to take on this project).

Now, to add to our woes, the Farmhouse boiler (hot water heater) heating element has failed and a new one must be installed at a cost of \$1,100.

The net effect means that the upcoming budget for Property is short around \$12,000.

Government's Survey on Electoral Reform

The B.C. government has posted an on-line survey asking what we would like in next fall's referendum on electoral reform and the types of voting systems we want considered.

However, **before responding to this survey, please read Fair Vote Canada's "Guide to Responding to the Government's Survey on Electoral Reform."**

A one-page summary of this Guide may be obtained at <http://victoriaunitarian.ca/wp-content/uploads/Govts-survey-on-voting-system-January-2018.pdf>, or from the SRC page at <http://victoriaunitarian.ca/program/social-responsibility-coalition/>. Print a copy and have it beside your computer as you complete the survey.

When at church, you can also pick up the summary Guide from the SRC shelf. It tells you how to connect to the survey, and explains that some questions are misleading or are based on faulty assumptions. Such questions could cause you to give the wrong impression of what you want.

It is important that as many of us as possible respond before the **deadline of February 28, 2018**. But it is also important that the government receives answers that truly correspond with what you want!

Remembering Jean Evans

Beloved Lifetime Member Jean Evans joined our church in 1980 and was an active member until the age of 94, when she moved to Sherwood Park, Alberta, to live near her family. She passed away on November 4 at the age of 98. In our service on November 5, we lit a candle in Jean's memory and shared a moment of silence to honour her life, and the congregation signed a card of condolence for her family. A plaque will be placed on our Memorial Wall in memory of both Jean and her husband Hy, and Jean's family will bring her ashes here to our Path of Remembrance for a private ceremony with one of our ministers. They sent the following letter and photos to share with the congregation in celebration of Jean's life:

Dear Family and Friends:

Our mother, Jean Buchanan Evans, slipped away in the early evening of November 4, 2017. She was 98 years old.

Mom was the hub of our family, always reaching out to each of us, as well as her friends. Mom understood how important making those connections is.

Mom was a wonderful storyteller and, through those stories, painted a picture of her life growing up and family members who, although gone, we felt we knew in some small measure.

As her children, we observed her strength and became strong ourselves. She taught by example.

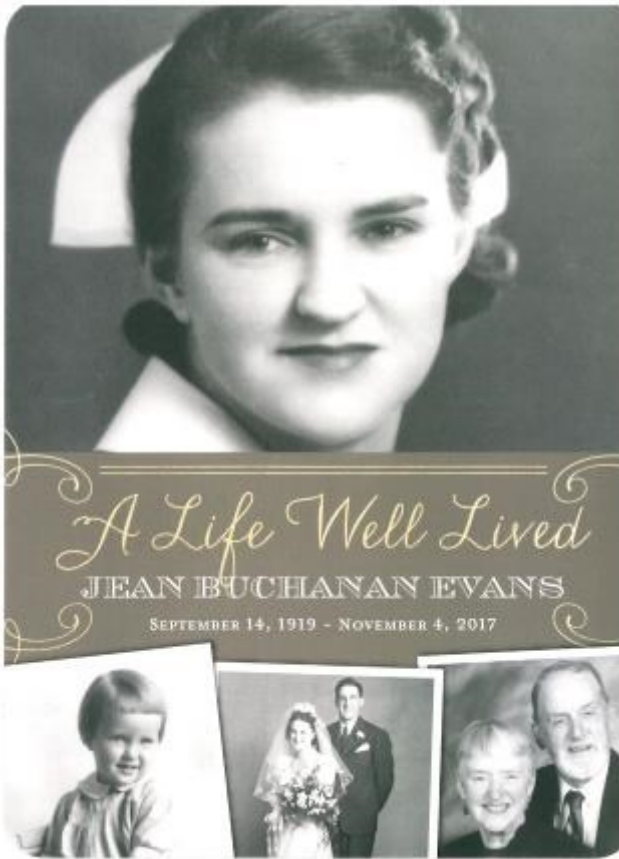
We were aware of the love our parents had for each other and for each of us, and of how much their friends meant to them. Mom and Dad had a wonderfully full life together.

In Mom's last years, her memories and stories slowly disappeared. She became a thin shell of her former self. However, her last words were words of love and a squeeze of her hand. I like to think that Dad has been patiently waiting for Mom - as he always did - and that they are now continuing on together.

In keeping with Mom's practice, we reach out to each of you, and tell you how much you meant to our mother. We hope you will enjoy this memento depicting Mom at different times in her life.

REQUEST FOR MINISTERIAL SURVEY QUESTIONS

GREEN CORNER**JIM JORDAN****A Home Energy Retrofit Using Heat Pump Technology
and the Case for Energy Conservation**

This month we highlight a residential home energy retrofit using a high efficiency heat pump installed in a Victoria home in 2010. EAT is sponsoring a workshop with *Don Scott*, the owner who carried out this retrofit.

These energy related home improvements have cut his home's annual carbon emissions by over 90% (~5015 kg) with a cost saving of approximately \$1500 annually, even with the price of electricity in BC increasing about 50% since 2000. A high efficiency heat pump was installed replacing an older oil furnace along with upgrades to doors/windows, insulation and lighting (LED bulbs).

The heat pump installed was a Mitsubishi Zuba Central unit adding an internal air handler connected to existing furnace heating ducts utilizing variable speed DC fan motors, with the addition of two 220- volt circuits using an existing 100- amp electrical service to power the two heat pump units. The nominal payback period of this upgrade is from 5.7 to 11 years implying a return on investment of between 6.5% and 13%, which is considered better than many other investments and virtually guaranteed.

Based on the savings realized for his residential home, a consultant has estimated the savings that could be attained if many home owners did this. Don recently made a submission to the BC Utilities Commission (BCUC), making the case that funding energy conservation using this technology would be a viable alternative to Site C. Don Scott is a public policy analyst and former MLA from Manitoba.

After church on January 28, you are invited to a Home Energy Retrofit Workshop with Don Scott in the Farmhouse Common Room.

JOINING GVAT (GREATER VICTORIA ACTING TOGETHER)

A Vote for Expanding Our Community Horizons

On January 21, 2018, our congregation will vote on whether to become paying members of GVAT (Greater Victoria Acting Together). GVAT is an organization initiated by Faith in Action, a small multi-faith group that had been lobbying the B.C. government for a decade to reduce homelessness in Victoria - without success. A new approach was needed.

GVAT is made up of leaders from faith groups, unions and civic groups representing thousands of members who aim to form a cohesive partnership that works to reweave the separate strands of civil society so as to transform our politics and our community for the common good. In our turbulent world, GVAT offers an innovative, communal way to solve future challenges.

Reverend Melora will be answering questions on GVAT in her sermon on January 14. To gain your input, the First Unitarian GVAT Core Team circulated December 10 and 17 in the Lion Hall to hear what you needed to know about GVAT to vote knowledgeably on January 21. You will have another opportunity to learn more about GVAT at a forum in the Common Room after Reverend Melora's sermon on January 14. For those who can't make that session, you can raise any questions on January 7 in the Library. As well, GVAT offers a training opportunity on January 20, and congregation members are encouraged to sign up.

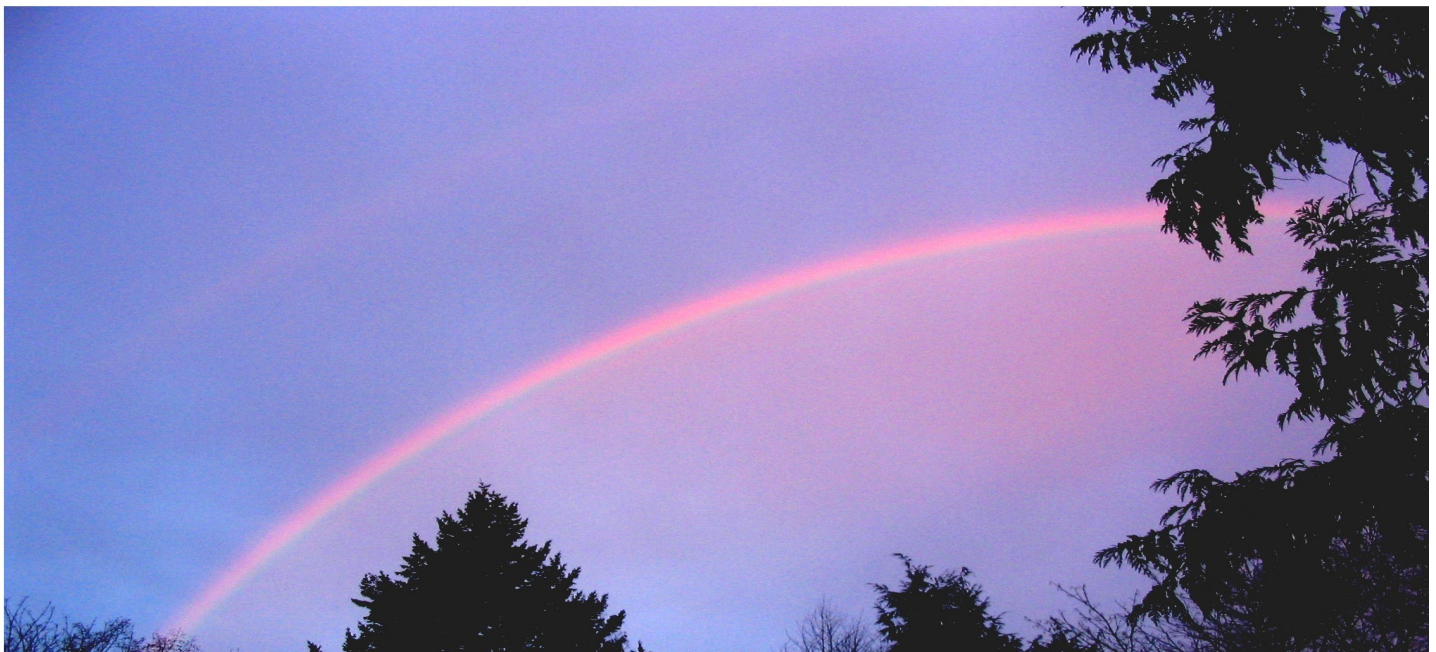
The vote will take place January 21 on the following motion:

Preamble to the Motion: One of the three FUCV (First Unitarian Church of Victoria) Strategic Plan themes is "service through compassionate action," and there has been a fair amount of interest expressed in joining GVAT. GVAT gives us an opportunity to re-imagine the way we can work in the wider community, and to fulfill the commitment to our Unitarian Principles. Several congregational members including Reverend Melora and some SRC and Board members have already been engaged in GVAT training in relational organizing.

The Motion: Be it resolved that FUCV become a member of GVAT in February 2018, and pay our membership fee of \$700/yr for a period of three years.

Whether the motion passes or not, GVAT has already been designated for our "Share the Plate" recipient for January 2018 (as it is a worthy cause and a registered charity). If we choose to become a member of GVAT, these funds can be used to pay our membership fees.

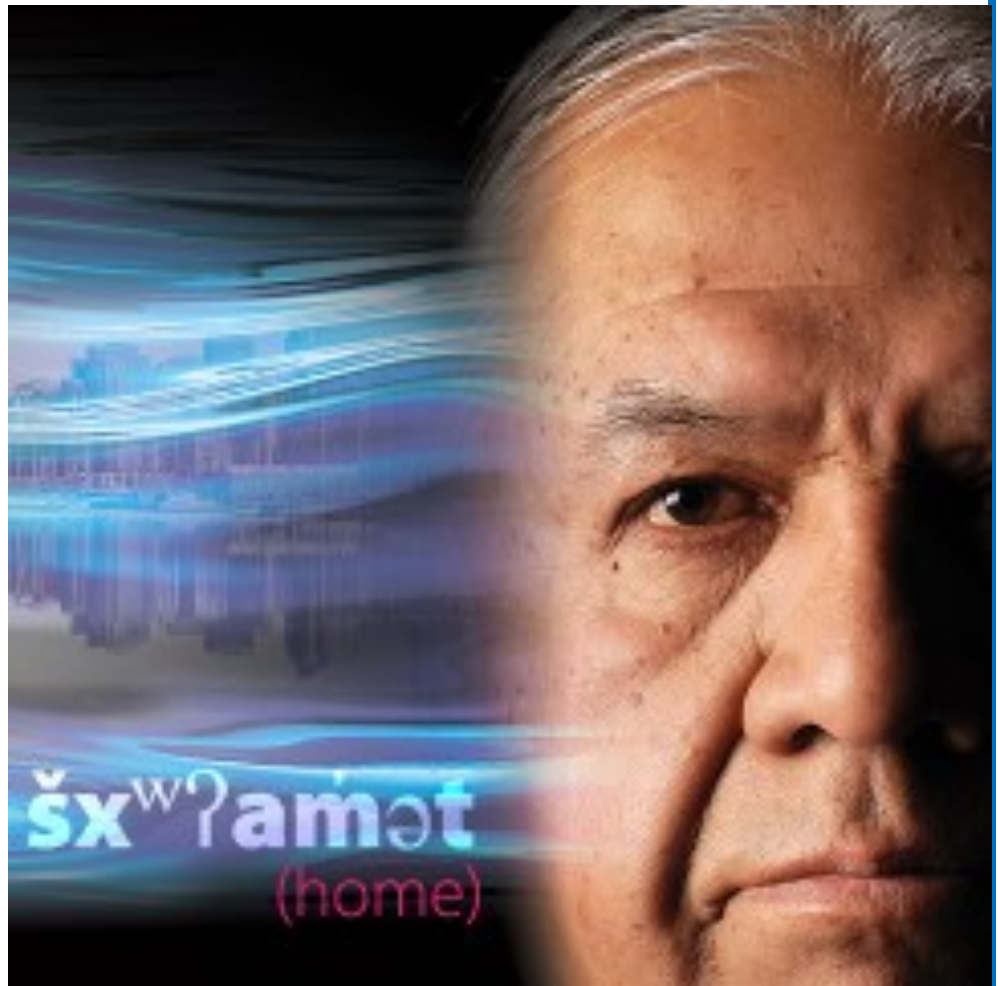

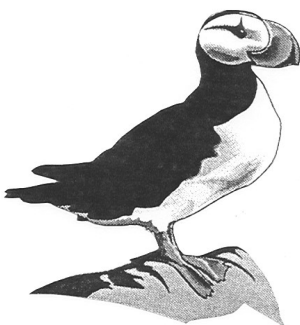
