Covid Guidelines for April



Why are we still asking you to wear a mask in the Sanctuary?

BC has now entered cold and flu season and health experts are urging people to wear masks at indoor gatherings to stop the airborne transmission of respiratory viruses, including COVID. The Omicron variants have been dominant in Canada for some months and they spread faster and evade immunity better than earlier strains. Now another new strain is starting to emerge that is sounding alarms about contagiousness, severity, and health-system impact. We want to keep our congregation safe and do our best to prevent any additional pressure on BC's strained health care system. The Church's COVID-19 team continues to monitor the situation, stay abreast of the current literature on COVID, and adjust our guidelines to keep the congregation both safe and happy. Our guidelines have been in general alignment with the BC COVID-19 guidelines while taking a more gradual approach and in consideration of the large number of vulnerable elders in our community.

Our guidelines have also been informed by recent research on COVID rates in the Capital Region and recent studies about the long-term effects of COVID infection, including the following:

- Number of Canadians in hospital with COVID has more than tripled since last year
- Possible 69% higher risk of Alzheimer's for older COVID survivors
- COVID-19 May Increase Risk of Diabetes in Children, CDC Study Finds

For the most up-to-date information on our guidelines, always refer to the e-weekly rather than the Newsletter.

- 1. Worship services. All services are now hybrid, available in person in the Sanctuary and the family-friendly Lion Lounge, or by Zoom. There are no capacity limits, no registration, and no vaccine mandates. Please respect others' comfort levels for social distancing and mask wearing.
- 2. Masks. The Sanctuary is designated as a mask-only zone Sunday mornings until noon, while masks are optional in the Lion Hall. We will ask people to mask as they enter the Sanctuary, and provide masks to people who do not have one. Masks may be temporarily removed by officiants, readers or for singing a solo. Microphone covers, which we use when speakers remove their masks, are being used as long as we continue wearing masks.

We recognize that it is impossible for us to guarantee 100% mask compliance in the Sanctuary. Some are concerned about the fact that some folks aren't able to keep masks 100% tight fitting over nose and mouth 100% of the time. Others find that wearing a mask at all makes it too hard to breathe or hear/read lips. Sadly, we can't meet everyone's needs in a single space when some of those needs are in direct opposition to one another. The best we can do is offer different options for worship participation that accommodate the different needs (including Zoom viewing at home and unmasked in-person viewing in the Lion Hall).

- 3. Groups. Committees, groups, teams, and choirs in rehearsal may gather in the church or elsewhere, masked or unmasked, at the discretion of the group.
- 4. Singing. For Sunday morning services, the choir and the congregation may sing with masks.
- **5. Air Circulation.** The Lion Hall, Farmhouse Common room and office have HEPA filters installed for air circulation. The HEPA filters should not be used in these locations when the windows or doors are open. The sanctuary's fans run continuously when the room is in use, completely replacing the air in the room every 20 minutes; it is important to keep the windows closed for proper circulation.
- 6. If Symptomatic. Anyone who has been diagnosed with COVID-19, or who has tested positive for COVID-19, or who has symptoms of COVID should not participate in small group activities in person and should not come into the Sanctuary or Lion Hall. If you have COVID

symptoms, consult the BC Centre for Disease Control for information on self-isolation and self-monitoring. Isolation rules vary depending on whether you actually had a positive COVID test, your age, whether people you come in contact with are fully vaccinated or not, and whether you are fully vaccinated yourself.

7. Children's and Youth's Programs. Children's and youth's programs have resumed. Contact Anna Isaacs for details.

They are a substance free facility that provides for those basic needs and security to which every individual is entitled. Above all, it is a home people can come to and feel safe and cared for, while being a part of something bigger. The Society does their best to provide that feeling of

being part of a family, because they firmly believe connection is the opposite of addiction or personal chaos. By building a trusting relationship with the person, and setting them up with personalized supports, they believe they are setting the person up for success.



The purpose of the Anawim Companion Society is:

- To provide for the charitable needs of people living in physical, emotional, spiritual, and social poverty.
- To provide help, care, and counsel to such persons in a way that invites self determination, mutual participation and the enrichment of love, dignity, and purpose in their lives.
- To provide for the advancement of education, understanding and companionship to such persons, to promote and achieve in whole or in part the purposes of the Society.

News Flash!!

Anawim Companions Society has officially broken ground on its new Women's House in Victoria, BC following the success of the Men's House,

The project, a dream of Anawim's for many years, was kick started by an incredibly generous person who donated her property outright for this very purpose. Not only will Anawim's Women's House provide safe transitional housing support for women looking to make a meaningful change in their lives, but it will also strive to provide residents a sense of community and belonging. Incorporating Anawim House's established 'Family Model' approach, the Women's House will be able to provide a secure residence to women at risk of homelessness due to poverty, fleeing violence or various health issues. It is anticipated that the women's residence will be ready for occupancy by late summer.

ENDANGERED ECOSYSTEMS ALLIANCE (EEA)

This charitable conservation organization was founded in September of 2018 by Canadian conservationist Ken Wu, working for the science-based protection of all native ecosystems and to support ecosystem literacy. Prior to becoming Executive Director of EEA, Ken was the Co-founder and Executive Director of the Ancient Forest Alliance between 2010 to 2018 and served as the Executive Director and Campaign Director of the Wilderness Committee in Victoria between 1999 to 2010, having graduated from the ecology and evolutionary biology department at the University of British Columbia. Ken spoke on behalf of the EEA at an Earth Day service at our Church prior to the Covid-19 pandemic a few years ago.



EEA works primarily at the federal level, as well as augmenting local and regional campaigns in the provinces and territories, to push for the protection of at least 50% of Canada in all terrestrial, freshwater and marine ecosystems by 2030.



Science shows that vastly scaling-up the protection and restoration of native ecosystems is a vital game-changer to help avert both the extinction crisis and the climate crisis.

Along with their national campaign efforts, the Endangered Ecosystems Alliance supports regional partners in their provincial campaign efforts. They engage non-traditional allies including businesses, unions, diverse faith groups, and multi-cultural outreach in order to greatly expand the total scale of the conservation movement. A critical part of their work is to work with First Nations organizations and communities to support Indigenous Protected and Conserved Areas (IPCA's), while working to arrange community-based financing to support such protected areas. They engage in science and policy research, public education, news and social media outreach, and major



public mobilizations. They will ultimately be working for a federal Endangered Ecosystems Act to protect all native and endangered ecosystems across the country on a much larger scale based on conservation biology principles and traditional ecological knowledge.

DRAFT MINUTES for BOARD MEETING on THURSDAY, MARCH 9, 2023 by Zoom

- **1. Call to order** The meeting was called to order at 2:03 pm.
- **2. Selection of Timekeeper and Process Observer** Evelyn Peters was selected as Timekeeper and Katherine Maas was selected as Process Observer.
- 3. Chalice Lighting Kathleen Zimmerman provided the Chalice lighting.
- **4. Check-in:** Joys and concerns were shared.
- **5. Approval of Agenda** Moved by Evelyn Peters and seconded by Katherine Maas that the agenda be approved, with the addition of items 11.10 Membership Update, and 11.11 Email re: Rental Space. **Carried.**
- **6. Approval of Minutes of February 9, 2023** Moved by Katherine Maas, seconded by Jeri Dause that the minutes of February 9, 2023 be approved as circulated. **Carried.**

7. Unfinished Business

- 7.1 <u>Stewardship Consultant Update</u> Reilly Yeo explained that Rachel Maxwell is organizing Zoom meetings from April 10-15, with a presentation on April 16 after the Sunday service. Her final report will be submitted on April 30. Reilly Yeo will subsequently organize an in-person session on engagement/strategic planning for representatives across the Congregation on May 5, with possible action items to be proposed for the AGM on May 28. **Action:** Reilly Yeo will send out a Doodle poll for a meeting with Rachel Maxwell and the Board on April 11. Kristina Stevens will send Kathleen Zimmerman a list of documents needed for the consultant.
- 7.2 <u>Proposed Joint Board Meeting with Capital UU in April via Zoom</u> Audrey Taylor has emailed Amanda Tarling, and hasn't yet had a response.
- **8. Ministers' Reports** No report, as the ministers are on sabbatical.

9. Reports

- 9.1 <u>Treasurer's Report</u> Kristina Stevens stated that the bookkeeper just sent the files late yesterday afternoon. Rentals are quite busy, and pledged and unpledged income are in good shape. Tax receipts have been sent.
- 9.2 <u>Council and Committee Reports and Questions Arising</u> Council Chairs submitted reports, and there were no questions.
- **10. Process Observer Report** Katherine Maas noted that there had been lively discussion and good participation.

11. New Business

- 11.1 Maintenance Budget Earle Anthony, Chair of the Building Maintenance Committee, explained that 2022 was a year of clean up after the pandemic, plus the drainage maintenance of the Farmhouse. We have discovered that we are well behind in maintenance – and actually need \$118,000 for maintenance costs in 2023. However, the budget has only authorized \$50,000 for maintenance. The workplan for 2023 includes repairing the leak in the foyer, and painting the Farmhouse. The hot water tanks were on their last legs and have been replaced. The ten upper windows on the west side of the sanctuary are tall and irregularly shaped. Last summer the window washers notified us that the windows were going to fail soon. The seal between the windows has failed, and the surround and aluminum frames have failed. The committee contacted four window suppliers, and all the suppliers agreed that the failure is imminent. Only one company would give us a quote of \$49,000 (the quote was only valid for 5 days, as the price of glass fluctuates on the world market). The committee will continue to look for quotes from contractors (as opposed to suppliers). If the window failure results in a leak, repairing the damage from a potential leak would mean closing the Sanctuary – a very costly and undesirable result. Earle presented two options: 1) Hang a tarp outside to protect the windows; or 2) Replace them this year. Moved by Al Hoffman and seconded by Katherine Maas that the Board agrees to fund the replacement of the upper Sanctuary west wall windows in 2023, and if necessary, recommend to the Congregation at the 2023 AGM to use Endowment Fund money to cover some or all of the costs. Carried.
- 11.2 <u>Committee Retention and Recruitment</u> The Stewardship Report and the Engagement Retreat will help address this issue, so this item was deferred.
- 11.3 <u>Kitchen Issues</u> Katherine Maas reported that two kitchens and many users make for some complications. The kitchens are used for Memorial services, by some renters, and for congregational life events. After 2 years of disuse, the kitchens have been cleaned and organized. The Table Fund has historically been used to buy equipment. **Action:** Kathleen to draft a letter for Audrey's signature to a congregational member thanking them for their energy and enthusiasm, and explaining that approval for any future expenditures will need to come from the relevant Council or Committee Chair first before spending money. As a general rule, expenditures in 2023 should be limited to replacing existing worn kitchen items only, not purchasing new items.
- 11.4 <u>Possible Division of Treasurer Responsibilities</u> Kristina Stevens recommended that this item be deferred, to become a part of the Stewardship consultations.
- 11.5 <u>New Abuse Prevention Coordinator</u> Audrey Taylor confirmed that the search still on to replace this important position. we need to find someone. **Action:** Kristina Stevens to talk to a member who is a former social worker to see if this might interest them.
- 11.6 <u>Checklist/Information for New Board Members</u> Kent Haden drafted a document with a checklist for new Board members, including the potential use of Google Workspace and a Google email address. The medical emergency at a recent Sunday service highlighted the need for the Board to be aware of the FUCV Medical Emergency Protocol. **Action:** Kathleen to ask Niki to copy and laminate copies of the protocol for the Ushers and Greeters box, and cc the email to Fran Hancock (Ushers and Greeters) and Lynne Bonner (Worship). Kathleen to ask Niki to either email the digital version (zip file) of the Board Binder or to create a Google docs link and send it to the Board.
- 11.7 <u>Insurance Premium Update</u> Bruce Nicol submitted an information note that the FUCV insurance was renewed. Only one underwriter was interested in offering us insurance. After changing all property deductibles to \$10,000 (some were at \$2,500 and others at \$5,000) for both the Sanctuary building complex and the farmhouse the premium for 2023 was \$37,778.
- 11.8 <u>Electronic Signatures for SELCY Program</u> Moved by Kristina Stevens, seconded by Jeri Dause that digital signatures be acceptable for the use of the Abuse Prevention Plan, subject to the insurance company's approval. **Carried. Action:** Kathleen Zimmerman to inform Anna Isaacs and ask for a follow up at a future meeting
- 11.9 <u>Policy on Overnight EV Charging</u> **Action:** Al Hoffman will consult further on costs and potential security issues of overnight EV charging, and come back to the Board with a recommendation.

- 11.10 <u>Membership Committee Update</u> Katherine Maas reported that Rebecca Mellett asked that the Nominating Committee to find a replacement for her as Chair of the Membership Committee. There has been a lot of attrition in that Committee. **Action:** Katherine Maas to email Rebecca to let her know that a replacement Committee Chair is available after the May 28 AGM.
- 11.11 <u>Email re: Rental Space</u> **Action:** Kathleen Zimmerman to send the member an email that the Board confirmed that the room in question is available to rent, and we will be reviewing that decision after 6 to 12 months.
- **12. Membership changes** Kathleen Zimmerman. **New Members:** 1 **(Kelly Legge)**; **Resigning Members:** 0; **Deceased Members:** 0; **New Friends:** 1 **(David van Stolk)**; **Deceased Friends:** 0.

Karen Furnes - Honoured Volunteer April 2023



I started attending the Unitarian Church of Vancouver as a child, when parents Penny and Ted Furnes joined the church. After my brother came home from the local United Church talking excitedly about walking on water and other magical feats, and I was "saved" at the Baptist Church down the street on my way home from school, my parents decided it was time to check out the Unitarian Church. We never looked back.

After living in Port McNeill from 1980 to 1983, I moved to Victoria with my young daughter, Autumn. During that time, I completed a diploma in Public Administration while living with my sister, Nancy and her family. They attended the Unitarian Church in James Bay, and I joined them. I lived in Port McNeill again from 1985 to 1995, before returning to Victoria. By this time, my parents were living in Victoria and attending First Unitarian. I soon joined my dad, Ted, in the choir.

Music has been an ongoing source of joy, nurture and community in my life. As well as singing with the Chalice Choir for the last 27 years, I have sung in a number of smaller choirs and ensembles in the church, and enjoy ringing with the church's Cantabile Handbell Choir! I am pleased to help lead the congregation in singing on occasion, when the choir is not performing.

As a member of FUCV, I have served two terms on the Board of Trustees and spent time on the Human Resources, Music, and Memorial Gardens Advisory committees. I was a member of the Interim Minister Task Force in 2009, and served as an Assessor for the Lifeline List project for six years. My partner, Barry Wiebe and I share a love of choral music, and both enjoy singing in the choir. We are both part of the organizing team for the Book and Bake Sale, and were part of the Sunday morning hospitality crew for several years before COVID hit.

After working for the BC Pension Corporation for twenty years, I retired from my role as a Senior Policy Analyst in 2015. Much of my time and energy is currently devoted to caring for my mom, Penny, and assisting two friends facing life-limiting illnesses. Pollinator Garden & Youth Fundraiser April 2nd





Pollinator Garden and Youth Fundraiser on April 2nd

Later this spring work will begin on constructing a pollinator garden on the front lawn of the First Unitarian Church of Victoria (FUCV). The initiative is supported by the Board, THRUU and the Gardens and Grounds Committee. Indigenous people have suggested that establishing this type of garden is an act of reconciliation, putting back what settlers removed and supporting native pollinators. The garden addresses the 7th principle of Unitarian congregation: "Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part." It also meets a goal of the FUCV's One Planet Saanich Action. The location at the front of the FUCV property communicates these values in practice to passers by

We have been able to keep the costs low through several initiatives. One of our new members, Delisa Lewis, has volunteered skill and machinery to strip the layer of sod from the site and build a berm. Several members have volunteered to assist. There are numerous native plants sowed in flats in Bob Stock and Evelyn Peter's back yard and these will be repotted with the assistance of THRUU members for

planting in fall. Evelyn Peters and Fran Pardee dug up shoots of Oregon Grape from one of the FUCV beds several months ago and 12 of the 14 shoots appear to be growing. We have secured a grant for additional plants from Pollinator Partnership Canada and we will apply for another grant, as well. However, we still need to purchase weed-free soil and mulch and some other materials.



At a ProD day last fall the youth planted Sea Blush, Native Yarrow, and Nodding Onions seeds. These are now growing and will be available for sale after the service on April 2^{nd} . The proceeds from this sale will be split between the Pollinator Garden and the Youth Group. Did you know that the coloured Yarrow many of us have in our gardens hybridizes with native Yarrow and contributes to its loss? Get some native replacements at this sale! You can contribute directly to the Pollinator Garden in a variety of ways: 1) buy a plant on April 2^{nd} ; 2) donate a native plant growing in your own garden; 3) volunteer; 4) donate by making a check out to the First Unitarian Church, with the phrase "Native Plant Garden" in the memo line.

With more than 75 programs and services, and over 125 staff, it provides wrap-around services in Careers and Employment, Health and Social programs, vibrant Youth initiatives and dynamic Arts and Cultural practices. The Centre also has an Indigenous library (the only one in a Friendship Centre in Canada and catalogued by UVic), a daycare centre, a

community kitchen and food hamper program and a homeless shelter from November to April annually. The Community Learning Program and the Soup Lunch are good ways to get to know what this vibrant organization is doing in Victoria.

Indigenous Matters is produced by the Truth, Healing and Reconciliation team of Unitarian Universalists (THRUU) in Victoria. Its mandate is to identify and facilitate opportunities for education and engagement, in the interests of contributing to the spirit of reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people in Greater Victoria.
