

Often we think of creativity only as a particular act of creation – writing, singing, painting. All of our living is a creative process. How we choose to spend our days and with whom and how we respond to various life events all draw forth creativity from us. If you think of your life as a work of art in process, what do you next long to create? When does your next creation involve letting go, or letting others' creations take centre stage?

A New Update From Your Covid Team

Like most other jurisdictions, BC is no longer reporting Covid data as often or as regularly as it did in the first two years of the pandemic. Coupled with the fact that the current variants usually result in a milder form of infection than did the earlier ones, this has led many people to lower their guard. Many of you have probably noticed that most people are no longer masking in the supermarket, for example. Theatres, restaurants, and bars have reopened and people are mostly not wearing masks there either. So why are we still asking you to mask in the Sanctuary during services?

The short answer to this question is – out of an abundance of caution. We want to keep our congregation safe and do our best to prevent any additional pressure on BC's strained health care system. There's still a lot to be learned about Covid, but here are some of the factors we've been considering.

- The incidence of Covid is actually higher today than it was in the early days of the pandemic. We just tend to hear less about it because most infected people aren't getting so seriously ill.
- We have a high population of elders, who are still among the high-risk groups when it comes to Covid.
- Because a lot of people are still getting Covid, the virus has more opportunity to mutate, which could give rise once again to more virulent strains.
- Long Covid remains a concern. Nearly 15% of people who've contracted Covid say they experienced lingering symptoms such as fatigue, shortness of breath or brain fog three months or more after their initial infection. And approximately half these cases morph into a much more serious and long-lasting condition called myalgic encephalomyelitis/chronic fatigue syndrome (ME/CFS).

- Researchers have also begun to identify other long-term side effects of Covid including increased risk post-Covid of <u>Alzheimer's</u> in elders and <u>diabetes in children</u>.
- The more often a person gets Covid, the weaker their immune system becomes.

What we know works to minimize risk:

- Masks lower the transmission rate, particularly close-fitting N95 masks.
- Good air circulation, such as we have in our church, helps lower transmission rates.
- Keeping vaccinations up to date protects not only you, but the people you come into contact with.

The Church's Covid team will continue to monitor the situation, stay abreast of the current literature on Covid, and adjust our guidelines to keep the congregation both safe and happy. We also plan to conduct another survey of the congregation to see where people stand on this, soon.

- 1. Worship services. All services are hybrid, available in person in the Sanctuary and the family-friendly Lion Lounge, or by Zoom. There are no capacity limits, no registration, and no vaccine mandates. Please respect others' comfort levels for social distancing and mask wearing.
- 2. Masks. The Sanctuary is designated as a mask-only zone Sunday mornings until noon, while masks are optional in the Lion Hall. We will ask people to mask as they enter the Sanctuary, and provide masks to people who do not have one. Masks may be temporarily removed by officiants, readers or for singing a solo. Microphone covers, which we use when speakers remove their masks, are being used as long as we continue wearing masks.

We recognize that it is impossible for us to guarantee 100% mask compliance in the Sanctuary. Some are concerned about the fact that some folks aren't able to keep masks 100% tight fitting over nose and mouth 100% of the time. Others find that wearing a mask at all makes it too hard to breathe or hear/read lips. Sadly, we can't meet everyone's needs in a single space when some of those needs are in direct opposition to one another. The best we can do is offer different options for worship participation that accommodate the different needs (including Zoom viewing at home and unmasked in-person viewing in the Lion Hall).

- 3. Groups. Committees, groups, teams, and choirs in rehearsal may gather in the church or elsewhere, masked or unmasked, at the discretion of the group.
- 4. Singing. For Sunday morning services, the choir and the congregation may sing with masks.
- 5. Air Circulation. The Lion Hall, Farmhouse Common room and office have HEPA filters installed for air circulation. The HEPA filters should not be used in these locations when the windows or doors are open. The sanctuary's fans run continuously when the room is in use, completely replacing the air in the room every 20 minutes; it is important to keep the windows closed for proper circulation.
- 6. If Symptomatic. Anyone who has been diagnosed with Covid, or who has tested positive for Covid, or who has <u>symptoms of Covid</u> should not participate in small group activities in person and should not come into the Sanctuary or Lion Hall. If you have Covid symptoms, consult <u>the BC Centre for Disease Control for information on self-isolation and self-monitoring</u>. Isolation rules vary depending on whether you actually had a positive Covid test, your age, whether people you come in contact with are fully vaccinated or not, and whether you are fully vaccinated yourself.
- 7. Children's and Youth's Programs. Children's and youth's programs have resumed. Contact Anna Isaacs for details.

SEED CHANGE, aka USC or Unitarian Service Committee Canada

Many of us will remember the Sunday speakers we have had from SEED CHANGE in past years. They reminded us of this great charity founded in 1945 by the famous refugee, Dr. Lotta Hitschmanova and rooted in the notions of human dignity and equality. It started post WWII with sending parcels of warm clothes to displaced refugees mostly in Europe and I remembered when these parcels occupied basements in the Ottawa and Toronto Unitarian churches.

Today, they know that good home grown food is key to the world's problems and so they changed their name and work with farmers around the world, including Canada. Sustainability is key, using locally adapted seeds. Thus communities thrive. Goal is to build food sovereignty by working with local partners to enhance biodiversity, promote ecological food systems, and counter inequity. I saw this in Nepal where they often took out patents on local seeds - before private corporations discovered them and then charged villagers to use. In Canada they focus on education particularly with youth. Overseas they focus on Africa and women. In Nepal they are very skilled in community development and very effectively help whole villages who ask them for their help. They even work with Child Haven where possible and some of us have witnessed this cooperation first hand.

DRAFT MINUTES for BOARD MEETING on THURSDAY, APRIL 13, 2023 by Zoom

- **1. Call to order** The meeting was called to order at 2:04 pm.
- **2. Selection of Timekeeper and Process Observer** Evelyn Peters was selected as Timekeeper, and Jeri Dause was selected as Process Observer.
- 3. Chalice Lighting Kent Haden provided the Chalice Lighting.
- **4. Check-in: Joys and Concerns** Joys and concerns were shared.
- **5. Approval of Agenda** Moved by Audrey Taylor, seconded by Evelyn Peters that the agenda be approved as circulated. **Carried**.
- **6. Approval of Minutes of March 9, 2023** Moved by Jeri Dause, seconded by Katherine Maas that the minutes of March 9, 2023 be approved as circulated. **Carried.**

7. Unfinished Business

- 7.1 <u>Stewardship Consultant Update</u> The consultant, Rachel Maxwell, has had Zoom meetings with the Ministers, the Board and various committees. She is scheduled to give an update to the congregation this Sunday after the service via Zoom.
- 7.2 <u>Community Services Fund Proposal Funding Status</u> Kent Haden reported that the application for assistance with digitizing files and setting up Google docs is still under review.
- 7.3 <u>New Abuse Prevention Coordinator</u> Audrey Taylor reported that a new person is interested in taking on the role after September, but the caveat is that they need to find a replacement for the other volunteer position that they currently hold at FUCV.
- 7.4 <u>Draft Policy on Overnight EV Charging</u> Al Hoffman has started the policy, but it is not yet complete. The current fee only covers the cost of the electricity, but not any depreciation in the charging unit. Currently there is no way to pay online. **Action:** Al Hoffman will bring a draft policy to a future meeting. 7.5 <u>Kitchen Update</u> Katherine Maas shared a document she had prepared. She identified that there is a need for a single point of contact for the kitchens, to make sure they are clean, properly equipped, and in good working order. She identified all of the kitchen stakeholders, including some that are not currently active, and asked for feedback on any other potential stakeholders. Rev. Shana suggested also adding a list of members who have their Food Safe certification. Katherine will add a column on the frequency of use by each user. **Action:** Katherine Maas will send the updated document to the Board, and will contact the current users to determine if any of them are interested in taking on this role.
- **8. Ministers' Reports** Rev. Shana Lynngood reported that the Ministers have recently returned from their sabbaticals. She shared an observation that the congregation has been going through a period of flux, change and loss and this period will probably take another two years. They are officiating at five memorial services over April and May.

9. Reports

- 9.1 Treasurer's Report Kathleen Zimmerman gave the report on behalf of Kristina Stevens. We are at 25% of the fiscal year, and income and expenses are on track. **Action:** Kristina Stevens to contact the Amplify UU Committee with the names of people who haven't yet fulfilled their Amplify UU pledge, and ask the Committee to follow up.
 - 9.2 <u>Council and Committee Reports and Questions Arising</u> Jeri Dause noted that the Book Sale Group has decided not to hold a sale this September. This may become a biennial event. When a sale was not held one year due to COVID, the quality of the books was higher and there was less waste. **Action:** Jeri Dause to ask Liz Graham to put a notice in the Eweekly. Al Hoffman noted that he and Earle Anthony will propose a change in maintenance budgeting at the May meeting. Al Hoffman also reviewed the property management report.
- **10. Timekeeper Report** Evelyn Peters reported that we are over halfway through the meeting.

11. New Business

- 11.1 <u>Preparing for the May 28 FUCV and FUCV Foundation AGMs</u> Jim Willis and Kathleen Zimmerman reviewed the previous year's agendas. Audrey Taylor volunteered to Chair the meeting in Jim Willis' absence. **Action:** Kathleen Zimmerman to send out an email to Council Chairs with list of Committees who submitted reports last year. The deadline for reports is May 1. Kathleen will also contact the office staff to let them know of the proposed timelines for the AGM packages.
- 11.2 <u>UUA Review of the 7 Principles</u> Evelyn Peters reported that the UUA is proposing to begin the process of revising their seven principles at their General Assembly in June. Rev. Melora is preaching about this topic on May 7. Rebecca Mellett has offered to find some FUCV delegates to virtually attend the meeting in June, and the delegates should do some research and consult with FUCV members. Moved by Evelyn Peters, seconded by Katherine Maas that we add delegate appointment for the UUA General Meeting at the May 28 AGM agenda. **Carried**.
- 11.3 <u>Shannon Oatway's Resignation and Replacement</u> Shannon Oatway has sent the Board and HR Committee a letter, stating she will resign as of June 1, 2023. Audrey Taylor informed the Board that the HR Committee has met to discuss the replacement hiring process, and then subsequently met with the Strategic Communications Committee.
- 11.4 <u>Nick Fairbank's Retirement and Replacement</u> Rev. Shana Lynngood noted that Nick Fairbanks has announced his retirement as of June 30, 2023. Two members of the Music Committee are willing to work on a Search Team. The new hire would start late August. The Board expressed their appreciation for Nick's ten years of service, especially during the pandemic.
- 11.5 <u>Special Donation</u> Kathleen Zimmerman reported on this item for Kristina Stevens. Moved by Kent Haden, seconded by Evelyn Peters that the special donation from a member should be used to fund an expenditure for the children/youth not to exceed \$3,000, and that the remainder should be deposited in the Property Fund. **Carried.**
- **12. Membership changes** Kathleen Zimmerman. **New Members: 0**; **Resigning Members: 0**; **Deceased Members: 2** (Allen Milne, Ruth Ralston); **New Friends: 0**; **Deceased Friends: 0**.
- 13. Announcements

 - 13.2 **CUC AGM:** May 19, 2023






Culture Competence Workshop - May 13th In the Sanctuary

Saturday May 13, 2023 from 10am to 3pm

In our mission statement, this congregation affirms that "we are a welcoming community, energized by the diversity of beliefs, identity, and experience that each person brings." To support this commitment, a workshop on culture competence will take place on May 13th in the Sanctuary. This is a four (4) hour workshop (from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. with a lunch break). It is an interactive workshop focusing on the management of social interactions with diverse people in everyday life. This workshop covers a wide spectrum of topics and will give participants a basic knowledge of tools and methods to improve culture awareness and sensitivity. While it is not taught as an anti-racism workshop, learning best practices on relating to different cultures will help reduce the conflicts due to race and other differences among us. Silvia Mangue will be facilitating the workshop. Silvia has been training and consulting individuals and organizations with a focus on eliminating prejudice, discrimination and stereotyping by encouraging respect for diversity, inclusion and equity. She is the founder of both Kulea Culture Society and Kulea Love Inc., as well as the President of the BC Black History Awareness Society. The workshop is limited to 8 participants and it will be on a first come, first serviced basis. If enough interest is shown a second workshop may be held in future.



Artist of the Month Evan Guengerich

Growing up with a father who was an avid photographer, a camera was never too far from my hand. Phases of enthusiasm came and went through the years—medium format, the darkroom, the advent of autofocus, etc.

About twelve years ago, when my daughter began playing competitive soccer, I picked up my first DSLR. After serving as the unofficial team photographer for a couple years, I thought, "I have a camera and a telephoto lens. I could take pictures of birds."

One trip to the local lagoon later, I was on my way to developing a passion for photographing wildlife and our natural world that has taken me from Alaska to Namibia to Australia and points in between.

The more time I spend in the field, the more I am convinced that what separates us from the animals is much less than what we have in common. While the reality of life can be harsh, we share the desire to love and be loved, to nurture and protect our family and friends, to play and relax, and to live in freedom.

Aside from taking compelling photos, my hope is to inspire people with the beauty that still remains in our world, whether in the park down the street or on the other side of the planet.

About this exhibit:

It's difficult for me to distill my photography to a few representative photos. But since it's May, my thoughts went to Mothers' Day and the outstanding women I've been blessed with in my life--my mother, my wife and my daughter. I've also spent time in the field with mothers who were courageous and selfless in demonstrating their love—the cheetah mother hiding her cubs in a safe place before going to hunt, the brown bear mother charging a large male in defense of her cubs, the wildebeest mother, alone and exposed on the plain, searching and calling for her lost calf. I selected a number of these photos with an eye toward mothers and their offspring and I dedicate this May exhibit to the mothers, both human and non-human, whose lives show us all the meaning of love.

community kitchen and food hamper program and a homeless shelter from November to April annually. The Community Learning Program and the Soup Lunch are good ways to get to know what this vibrant organization is doing in Victoria.
